SCHOOL BOARD RECOGNIZES SBAA **FOR CO-EX GRANTS**



The South Bend school board recognized the Alumni Association on December 5 for its Co-Ex Grants and other educational initiatives.

Steve Luecke, Alumni Association executive director, attended the school board meeting along with Jessica Brookshire, chair of the SBAA board; Dave Dunlap, chair of the Co-Ex Grants Committee; and Nancy Sulok, office manager.

As a retired teacher and coach, Dunlap said he appreciates the value of co- and extracurricular activities in a student's overall educational experience. That is why he got involved with the SBAA's Co-Ex program. "Although most people think athletic teams when thinking extra-curricular," he said, "25 percent of the grants went to fine arts, academic, and civic service programs." Some 2,000 students have benefited from the grants, he added.

The grants program continues to thrive. Brookshire said \$56,463 was distributed to schools in 2016. In return, students "pay it forward" by performing community service. "Our students are out serving meals, cleaning neighborhoods and parks, and helping and participating in various community events," said Brookshire.

Luecke noted the SBAA had just wrapped up its annual Community Hall of Fame Banquet, which recognizes outstanding members of our city. Proceeds from that event help to support the Co-Ex Grants.

But beyond that, Luecke said, the SBAA has co-sponsored a tennis tournament in April with the University of Notre Dame and a golf tournament in May.

The Ace for Science tennis tourney raised almost \$10,000 in 2016, which was awarded as grants to South Bend teachers for STEM programs. Proceeds from the 2016 golf tournament helped the SBAA to award \$39,500 in scholarships for SBCSC graduates.

Luecke thanked the School Board of Trustees for their support of these initiatives. School Board member Maritza Robles praised the SBAA for its support of local school programs. Board President Jay Caponigro said he looks forward to a

LETTER FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR



Dear alums.

The South Bend Alumni Association is proud to be an active member of Team South Bend ... where students thrive, excel, and achieve SUCCESS! We welcome our new Superintendent, Dr. Kenneth Spells, and pledge our support for the SBCSC school corporation and its students.

We also welcome new SBAA leadership. Jessica Brookshire was elected chair of the Board of Directors. Ryan Kring is the new vice-chair, Kevin Fautz the new secretary, and Lauren Davis continues as treasurer. This leadership team is committed to the SBAA mission to provide grants for extra-curricular activities.

With your help in 2016 we were able to provide 41 Co-Ex Grants to 13 schools totaling \$56,463. These awards supported academic competitions, arts performances, and athletic teams. It was a record year for this program!

In his book "Our Kids," Robert Putnam writes: "Consistent involvement in extracurricular activities is strongly associated with higher grade-point averages, lower dropout rates, lower truancy, better work habits, higher educational aspirations, lower delinquency rates, greater self-esteem, more psychological resilience, less risky behavior, more civic engagement, and higher future wages and occupational attainment." In short, students who participate in extra-curricular activities are more likely to succeed in school and in life.

We want to make sure that all our students have that opportunity. You can read more about the Co-Ex program in this issue of Alumnews.

In 2016, in partnership with the College of Science at the University of Notre Dame, we hosted our third and final Ace for Science Tennis Tournament. This initiative raised almost \$30,000 to support science projects for students from kindergarten through high school.

We are grateful for the work of Dr. Margaret Dobrowalska-Furdyna and Kathy Peterson for their help in making these resources available in our classrooms, stimulating curiosity, creativity, and an appreciation for scientific discovery.

2017 will be another productive year for the Alumni Association. Plans are underway for our Scholarship Golf Outing in May, and we have already begun committee work to prepare for the South Bend Hall of Fame Dinner in November. That banquet has become a premier evening to celebrate the people who make a difference in our community. There are pictures and news from the most recent gala in this issue.

We are also implementing a new database that will help us to be in better communication with you and other friends of the SBAA. Your support helps us and our students thrive.

JESSICA BROOKSHIRE ELECTED AS NEW LEADER OF SBAA

Jessica Brookshire sees the coming year as a time of continuing growth and development for the Alumni Association. She was elected in September to chair the Board of Trustees. Also elected were two new board members.

Brookshire, a graduate of Adams High School and an employee of the University of Notre Dame, sees the challenges of the new year in efforts to increase fundraising and membership. Implementation of a CRM (customer relationship management) program to help track



members and donors will be a significant step forward, she says. Her goal is to move the SBAA forward into the digital age by becoming more of an "electronic organization."

In addition to her work with the Alumni Association, Jessica is heavily involved with United Way, running the campus campaign every year. She serves on the St. Joseph County Health Improvement Alliance and sits on a committee for the Harper Cancer Research Institute. She also is on the state advisory board of the Community Health Partnerships.

Brookshire replaces Paul Laskowski, who served for two years. He will remain as a board member. The board presented him with an engraved clock to thank him for his service.

THE MORE THINGS CHANGE

The Alumni Association is constantly changing, and during the past few months we have changed our address, telephone number, and email address.

The South Bend Community School Corporation, which provides our office space and other support, upgraded to a new phone system in October. That resulted in new phone numbers for us. The old phone numbers will continue to work for a while, but eventually will be phased out. Our address changed when the City of South Bend decided to rename the street in front of our building. Finally, we changed our email address to simplify it. The new address is sbaa@sb.school. It has fewer characters than the old email and will be easier to remember. The old email will still get through to us.

One thing that hasn't changed is our location. We remain on the first floor of the School Administration Building, just south of the Key Bank Building and across from the Century Center parking lot. -



ommunity involvement "is something everyone can do, using the skills and talents they have," according to Bruce **Bancroft, local attorney.**

He was one of seven new members inducted in November into the South Bend Community Hall of Fame. More than 500 people attended the induction banquet and award ceremony on November 17 at Century Center.

Other inductees were:

Howard Buchanon II, former South Bend fire chief; Lois Whitacre Clark, community activist; the late Joseph Luten, former principal in several South Bend schools; Ann Puzzello, former teacher, city council member and community promoter; and Gabrielle Robinson, retired IUSB professor and local historian. Florence Troeger, who died in 1981, was the historical inductee. She was the first woman golf pro in Indiana.

South Bend Common Council Member John Voorde received the Ideal Baldoni Distinguished Public Service Award. Peg Dalton, owner of Le Peep restaurant, received the Distinguished Achievement Award. Other honors were given to REAL Services, the Distinguished Community Service Award, and to Electronics, Inc., owned by Jack Champaigne, the Contributions to Education Corporate Award.

A notable change at the 2016 banguet was the elimination of the head table. Honorees were seated in the audience among their family and friends. They were brought to the stage at the

appropriate time to receive their honors. "It was nice to sit with our family for dinner," Bancroft said. "The Hall of Fame Awards Banquet was perfectly planned and impeccably executed," said Becky Zaseck, director of REAL Services. "I can't imagine what a job it must have been for months to accomplish all that it must have taken to have every detail come off so well," added Lois Clark.

Gabrielle Robinson, who was born in Berlin and settled here as an adult, said "it is a tremendous honor to be in this group of educators and public servants, dedicated to making South Bend a better place to be."

Ann Puzzello, who grew up in Niles, said she wouldn't choose to live anywhere but South Bend. "I do love South Bend," she said, "and will continue to serve my community in the best way I can."

Andy Troeger traveled to the banquet from New Mexico to accept the induction of his great-aunt, Florence Troeger. "We recognize her," Andy Troeger said, "because she devoted her life to the service of others, and especially the kids who grew up golfing at Studebaker (Golf Course)."

James Kapsa, Hall of Fame committee chairman, said plans already are underway for the 2017 banquet. A search committee began meeting in February.

> Nominations are accepted year-round for induction into the South Bend Community Hall of Fame. Anyone can submit a nomination with a biography and two letters of support for the person being nominated. Candidates must have resided in or been involved with the South Bend community for 10 or more years. They must have significant achievements and/or made notable contributions when serving others locally, statewide, nationally, and/or globally. Names are considered first by a search committee, which selects roughly 20 names for forwarding to a selection committee. The selection committee reviews the names and selects the six inductees, along with a historical inductee. Candidates not selected remain on the HOF list for consideration in the future. MAYOR PRESENTS LUECKE WITH KEY TO THE CITY

South Bend Mayor Pete Buttigieg surprised Steve Luecke during the Community Hall of Fame Banquet by presenting him with a Key to the City. Luecke has been executive director of the SBAA since June 2013.

The presentation was kept a secret from Luecke, who served as South Bend's mayor for 15 years before retiring from that job in 2011. Mayor Buttigieg, who succeeded Luecke in the mayor's office, said the Key to the City is the highest honor bestowed by South Bend.

Buttigieg said Luecke laid the groundwork for many of the projects that either were completed or are proceeding to fruition under the current administration.

Luecke received a standing ovation from the Hall of Fame audience.

COLLEGE SCHOLARSHIPS AVAILABLE

TCU SUPERINTENDENT SCHOLARSHIPS

The SBAA will continue to offer its signature TCU Superintendent Scholarships in 2017, according to Connie Varga, Scholarship Committee chairman. These awards provide \$1,000 a year for four years to one graduating senior from each of the five South Bend Community School Corporation high schools.

JACK CHAMPAIGNE SCHOLARSHIP

The Alumni Association will also offer the Jack Champaigne Scholarship and the South Bend Press Club Scholarship, which are funded by outside donors. The Champaigne Scholarship is worth \$5,000 and is offered to a graduating SBCSC senior who plans to attend Purdue University, either in West Lafayette or at the South Bend campus. It is funded by Mishawaka businessman Jack M. Champaigne, a 1961 graduate of Adams High School.

THE SOUTH BEND PRESS CLUB SCHOLARSHIP

The Press Club Scholarship is worth \$500 and is offered to a senior who plans to study journalism or mass communications in college. The student must be a SBCSC student or have a parent or grandparent who is an active member of the South Bend Alumni Association


