Steve Luecke

Steve Luecke served as mayor for the city of South Bend from 1996 to 2011. The



tenure made him the longest serving mayor for the city. During those years, he helped guide the city from its manufacturing heritage to an economy based on technology and research. His team focused on reducing the size of government, improving services, strengthened partnerships and spurred development.

During his tenure, the city was named an All-American City in 2011 and won the National League of Cities Gold Award for Municipal Excellence in 2002 and 2010. From bike and pedestrian paths to restoration of the Morris Performance Arts Center and improved park facilities, Luecke enhanced the quality of life for the city's residence.

Luecke grew up in Freeport, Ill., in a family with a strong commitment to service and volunteerism. After graduation from Fordham University, he and his wife Peg moved to South Bend. He had a four-year carpentry apprenticeship, then was a partner in the Old Building Recycling Co., which restored older homes. In 1981 he joined South Bend Heritage Foundation as a project manager. He was elected to the City Council in 1987. He replaced Joe Kernan as mayor in a special election.

After leaving office, he was named the executive director of the South Bend Alumni Association. After retiring from the alumni association in 2017, he was named to its Board of Trustees. He is also commissioner for the Housing Authority.

Peter H. Mullen

Peter H. Mullen served his country, city, county and community with spirit and professionalism. A Boston native and a graduate of Boston College with a degree in economics, he served as paratrooper in the Army and as a Green Beret. Following the service, he entered the business world with Sunoco Oil. After several moves, the family decided that South Bend would be home. He calls it the greatest place on earth.

His public service came in two segments. He was the city controller for four years under Mayor Peter Nemeth. He retired in 2006 from the business world but decided that he wasn't quite ready to retire completely. Later, he was the St. Joseph County



auditor for two terms. As auditor he navigated the county through the financial crisis and circuit breaker implantation in 2008. Mullen retired from the auditor's office in 2014.

As a citizen, he followed social justice tenants and caring for others by serving as a board member of REAL Services, Madison Center, Chamber of Commerce, and Friends of the Library. Mullins played a role in creating a drop-in center for the homeless, Our Lady of the Road, managed by the Catholic Worker community.

He and his wife Mary Lou raised three children, Peter Jr., Tracy and Brendan. They have nine grandchildren.

Tina Marie Patton

Tina Patton is a South Bend pastor, businesswoman, mentor and leader who is



passionate about the women and children in the community. She is president of Be Inspired, Inc., an organization that prepares women for leadership and success. Patton has served on various boards including Memorial Hospital, South Bend Symphony, South Bend Community Schools, Hannah's House, Ivy Tech, Community Foundation and YWCA. She frequently speaks on business and finance.

She is pastor and co-founder of Kingdom Life Christian Cathedral with her husband, Michael Patton.

Through her work with Cross Communities CDC, which is a partnership of Kingdom Life and Holy Cross Church, she is

working to revitalize neighborhoods and provide housing on the northwest side.

She is member of South Bend Chapter of the Links, Inc., which is a service organization geared to the needs of women and children.

She is one of 12 children of Robert Taylor Sr., and Clara Taylor. Patton has a bachelor's degree business administration from IUSB and an MBA from Notre Dame. She joined Indiana Trust Management in 1989 and is vice president/director of information technology. The job entails security, training and planning.

Richard J. Pfeil

Richard J. Pfeil is a businessman, councilman and visionary who enthusiastically supports job creation and innovation. In 2011, he founded the Pfeil Innovation Center in South Bend in conjunction with Beacon Health. The center supports creativity, listening and thoughtful change in businesses both local and across the county.

He is a member of the St. Joseph County Council and serves on the boards of IUSB, Ivy Tech, Indiana Chamber of Commerce and Indiana Manufacturers Association.



Pfeil graduated with a bachelor's degree in electrical engineering from Michigan State in 1954. He followed that with an MBA from Indiana University in 1956. He joined Koontz-Wagner Electric Co. in 1956 and secured as CEO of the secure from 1062 to 2008. Use team led the secure

served as CEO of the company from 1963 to 2008. His team led the company through a series of expansions from \$2 million to more than \$70 million in yearly sales. The company grew to 550 employees.

He was honored with South Bend's Man of the Year; E. M. Morris Award from IUSB; and the South Bend-Mishawaka Area Business Person of the year.

Dick and his wife, Donna, co-chaired the \$6.2 million South Bend YWCA Capital Campaign. They have also supported projects at IUSB and Holy Cross College.

The Pfeils have five adult children – Mary, Laura, John, Holly and Eric.

John Warren:

John P. Warren has served the Pokagon Band in some capacity for most of his adult



life. He was elected tribal council chairman in 2014. He served as a member-at-large on the council from 2006-2011 and council treasurer from 2011-2014.

As council chairman, he is the CEO and chairman of the Pokagon Gaming Authority Board, which oversees the band's casino properties including Four Winds South Bend, Four Winds New Buffalo, Four Winds Hartford and Four Winds Dowagiac.

While on council prior to federal recognition, he worked with Notre Dame's Law School to create the first draft application that led to the reaffirmation of the Band's sovereignty in 1994. As treasurer, he directed the implementation of quarterly financial

reviews, key performance indicators, and financial policies and procedures for the developing tribal government.

Born and raised in South Bend, Warren has traveled the United States and Canada educating others about the Pokagon Band and Potawatomi culture. He is a traditional dancer, and a singer and drummer with the Ribbon Town Singers.

He has an associate degree of applied science in business administration from Ivy Tech and is a veteran of the U.S. Army and Indiana National Guard. He and his wife of more than 41 years, Patrice, live in Granger, and have three children and ten grandchildren.

Oliver, Anne, and Jane Cunningham

As a business, the Oliver Chilled Plow Work was vital to the growth of South Bend. The Oliver family created a legacy that went beyond manufacturing. James Oliver, and his son, J.D. Oliver were quiet investors in the community and funded many public buildings. In turn, the subsequent generations have continued the legacy of philanthropy. In 1988, the grandchildren of J. D. and Anna Oliver donated two glorious houses - Copshaholm,



808 W. Washington St., and their mother's Victorian home at 630 W. Washington. The sale of the Victorian house, which is now known as the Oliver Inn Bed & Breakfast, supported the operation of Copshaholm as a house museum managed by the Northern Indiana Historical Society. The donation in honor of their grandparents ensured that the mansion would be shared in perpetuity with the community. The donation was made by Joseph Oliver (Ollie) Cunningham, Anne Cunningham and Jane Cunningham. They were the children of Gertrude Oliver and Charles Frederick Cunningham. Joseph (Ollie) passed away in 2013 and Anne Cunningham Downey McClure died in 2015. Jane Cunningham Warriner and the Oliver descendants frequently visit the area to continue the strong traditions started by the family patriarch, James Oliver.

Alex Arch

Alexander L. Arch (March 19, 1894 to Dec. 9, 1979) pulled the lanyard that sent the first



shot from American artillery at the start of World War I. Arch was a sergeant with Battery C, 6th Field Artillery. Under the command of General John Pershing, the battery moved into position near the village of Bathe Lemont in France. Shortly after 6:05 a.m. Oct. 23, 1917, the shot was fired and it screamed toward the German artillery battery. According to Arch, 17 more shots were fired in the next two hours.

The New York Times reported a week later "Indiana Sergeant Fired First Shot."

Arch was born in Hungary and immigrated to South Bend in 1903 with his parents, Istvan and Terezia Arch, and two siblings. Alexander Arch worked at Singers and Oliver Chilled Plow before

joining the Army in 1913. He set sail for France in 1917.

Arch was wounded in 1918 and returned home in 1919. He was met with a hero's welcome in South Bend. He began working at Studebaker Corp. and later married Julia Rebics in 1924. They had four children and lived at 1407 Dubail St. He died at the age of 85 in 1979. He is buried at Chapel Hill Memorial Garden, Osceola. Arch Street near the St. Joseph River is named in his honor.

IDEAL BALDONI DISTINGUISHED PUBLIC SERVICE AWARD - Todd Zeiger

Todd Zeiger appreciates a mature building. As a child on family trips across the country he observed similarities in buildings from city to city. He told his parents he wanted to buy and

save houses. They went along with it. He witnessed the demolition of South Bend's downtown during the Urban Renewal and thought there was a better way.

Building on his interests, he found a college that offered a degree in historic preservation. He honed his skills with an internship with Southold Restorations.

Today, he is director of the Northern Regional Office of Indiana Landmarks. He oversees 21 counties to carry out the mission of saving meaningful places. Historic Preservation uses practical approaches to repurposing vintage properties. He consults, advocates, guides and protects houses and buildings that deserve a second chance.



Zeiger has been involved in scores of projects such as Old Republic in New Carlisle, Studebaker Tree Sign in partnership with the St. Joseph County Parks, B'nai Synagogue which is now the Cubs Team Store, the Remedy Building relocation and restoration, and the Kizer House project. Indiana Landmarks works with many groups to make the projects successful.

He and his wife Terri live on a fifth-generation farm. They have three children, Lindsey (and Gib) Spaulding, Rachael, and Jacob.

DISTINGUISHED ACHIEVEMENT AWARD - Sara Stewart - Unity

Unity Garden grew from Sara Stewart's interest in public health. While working on her



master's in nursing, Stewart grew more concerned with socioeconomic issues, the food safety net and the general health in the city. She discussed the idea of creating a garden. The idea led to a little green spot on the southwest side of the city in 2008. In addition to healthy food, it was a place for all people to gather and to have hope. The garden concept has grown to more than 50 gardens spread throughout the city. Chickens and bees are now part of the plan.

Unity sponsors free gardening classes, summer camps and wellness groups to teach the community about the joy of peas and carrots.

Stewart's expertise includes communications, public relations, human resources, volunteer coordination, grant writing, business administration and working with gardening crews.

Unity Gardens

The garden on Ardmore Trail now includes a community learning center for classes, a farmers' market and meeting rooms.

The gardens are battling obesity rates by providing healthy food and are giving a new generation a way to connect to nature and sustainability. There is hope in growing food.

Trinity School

Trinity School at Greenlawn, with the assistance of John Adams High School, started a mock trial program in 2005 with an all-freshman team. Coached by Tracy

Knox, a local attorney, this neophyte team qualified for state competition. Building on the experience, the school has continued to send teams to Indianapolis. In the last four years, Trinity teams have competed in the final round and won the state championship the last two years.



In 2019, Trinity School fielded six teams and five qualified for the state competition. Three of those teams placed - first, third and fifth in a field of 24. The senior team "Ides of March" traveled to Georgia for the national championship. Facing stiff competition from around the states and world, the team placed 11th overall. The team was coached by Peter Morgan and Jesse Barrett, local attorneys.

Dennis Staffelbach, an attorney and teacher at Trinity School, started the program and continues to serve as a coordinator. He attributed the success to hardworking students, dedicated coaches and the collaborative nature of the program.

Trinity School has received assistance, mentoring, and support from a number of attorneys and parents including Kari Gallagher, Jim Keenan, Gerry Bradley, Joel Gabrielse, Christine Venter, Kelci Schmidt, Dani Campbell Weiss, Vonnie Trumble, Christian Carlson, Sheila Loughran and Mike Palmer. The school extends its thanks to them and many others.

DISTINGUISHED COMMUNITY SERVICE AWARD - La Casa de Amistad

For more than 25 years, La Casa de Amistad has developed opportunities for Latinax youth, families and immigrants in the South Bend region. Founded in 1973,

the center began as a small youth outreach program founded by Rev. John Phalen, C.S.C., and other community members who understood the challenges faced by vulnerable populations.

Today the center honors their vision as a regional hub and leader in education, neighborhood and immigration advocacy.



La Casa de Amistad provides educational, cultural and advocacy services in a welcoming, bilingual environment to empower the community from birth to adulthood. For youth, there is preschool, youth tutoring, enrichment programs and summer camps. Adult programs cover English classes, computer skills, citizenship classes, digital assistance, translations, food pantry and social service referrals.

Along with a legal immigration clinic, the South Bend ID program, Know Your Rights workshops, and the No Human Being is Illegal campaign, the center relentlessly advocates for immigrants and Latinax community.

The center served more than 7,000 individuals in the community. Thanks to community support, La Casa de Amistad continues to live out its mission.

CONTRIBUTIONS TO EDUCATION CORPORATE AWARD - SB Regional Chamber

The South Bend Regional Chamber's commitment to education is based on the belief that people are the most important asset. When each child reaches their full



potential, the community is strengthened. With this, businesses receive talented individuals ready to work, and the economy continues to grow. Since the beginning of its history, the chamber has been involved with South Bend schools from serving on committees, both standing and special; volunteering in classrooms to create

connections to business members, and developing programs that support both teachers and students.

The chamber was a key partner in establishing "Ready to Grow St. Joe," the early childhood coalition working to ensure that young children have access to programs for success in school and life. In partnership with businesses and educators, the chamber developed "Manufacturing Day" programming, "Educator Externship" experiences, and "Intern South Bend Region," a program designed to retain talent and prevent the brain drain.

The chamber is engaged in career counseling, "Pathways to Work" in schools, and being a collaborative partner with schools, businesses and affiliated organizations.
